Ladies and Gentlemen,

Changes in personnel, positions within the department, and the manner in which we do our job continue to evolve at a rapid pace. I am proud to say that the Marshfield Police Department has an excellent retention of its officers. The variance in personnel that we have seen over the past five years has been through retirements. In May, we hired another experienced officer from the Wood County Sheriff's Office and even though I feel a little guilty, I refuse to give him back. Jason Foemmel came to us with eight years of experience, and his professionalism and leadership qualities have earned him the respect of the entire department. Our most recent hire came to us by way of the Lac Du Flambeau Police Department. Blake Borchardt is nearly completed with his Field Training Officer Program and will soon be on his own patrolling the city and assisting citizens. We are blessed to have found the talent and skills of these two young men. Blake was hired as a result of a Community Oriented Police (COPS) grant that was awarded in late 2013. The grant funds approximately one-half of his salary and benefits for a three-year time period. The purpose of this grant was to add an additional full-time drug officer to our staff which occurred early this January. Derek Iverson, a four-year veteran of the department was selected for this role. Derek possesses natural investigative instincts and would not be the guy I would want on my trail if I were dealing drugs in this community. His impact has already been felt by the drug world, and he is only warming up. Even though I have a fondness for the personnel just listed, I find that our overall staff is one that is courteous to its citizens, highly accomplished and extremely effective in what we do and what we are asked to do. We now stand forty-eight strong to serve the needs of the community and protect those who are unable to protect themselves.

A group of people that need to be commended on their actions this year is the union bargaining committee. In a year when the changes taking place could have been painful for the organization, they represented their unit with poise and dignity and entered into a new contract with city administration that was beneficial to all. A result of their commitment is a continued positive culture.

Technology is ever changing. The manner in which we do our jobs has been enhanced dramatically just over the past few years. You can only imagine the evolution I have been witness to in my thirty-three years of service with the organization. We had no computers when I began my career. Any information sent and received was by teletype. Data entry was all done and filed by hand, and DNA was just three letters out of sequence. Typewriters were the clerical tool of the day, digital cameras were not even dreamed of, and cell phones did not show up for another fifteen years. With the tools provided to us now to address complaints and solve our crimes, well, it's no wonder we have become rather good at it. The scales are now unbalanced, and it is not a good time to be a criminal.

Each of our members is encouraged to lead us into the future with vision and ideas for improvement, and doing the same things tomorrow that we did yesterday does not move us forward. Law enforcement many years ago had been based upon the premise of letting the fight come to you. In the late 1970s and into the future, we learned that proactive and community policing was the manner in which the battle would be won. Education of our youth, providing positive outlets in the community, providing counselling and understanding rather than the focus of punishment, all made a tremendous difference on the crime rate. Today, we have an Officer Friendly Program and two Police School Liaison Officers. Our other officers are involved in training in areas of expertise that interest them, and they are called upon to share their knowledge with the citizens of the community, all in the name of protection and prevention. The program works and our juvenile crime rate has been reduced dramatically as a result. Each and every year we examine what we have done and what we must do better. We do not strive to be a good police department, we strive for excellence.

2013 Notable Highlights

Our Transport Officer Program remains highly effective from a safety perspective as well as having significant budgetary impacts. The program allows us to keep our staff at an appropriate level and provide a safe environment not only to our citizens, but our officers as well.

Our most important statistic is that of our violent crime index. That index fell 7% in 2013. Homicide was reduced from two in 2012 to zero in 2013. Robbery was also reduced while aggravated assault increased 25%. Of the thirteen violent crimes occurring in 2013, arrests were made in all but two events for an 85% clearance rate.

The total numbers of Part I index crimes reported were reduced 27.9%. This represents a tremendous decrease from the year prior. We always exercise caution with a single year statistic due to its potential volatility but from a department and community perspective, it is encouraging to see such a decrease.

It is with great enthusiasm that I report to you that the solve rate on Part I crimes in 2013 was at an all-time high of 57%. To provide you a perspective of the level of this accomplishment, the typical statewide and nationwide averages are about 25-28%. This level of success does not

emanate from one group of people. It is truly a team effort of the forty-eight members of this department, each of whom plays their part in this success. Teamwork is one of our values that we emphasize on a daily basis, and we are an example of how this benefits the community.

It is with great pride, honor, and humility that I provide this annual report to you as my last. I have officially declared my last day of employment at the Marshfield Police Department to be May 15, 2014. It was a difficult decision to make but my retirement awaits me, and there are goals and dreams on my horizon. I am so pleased to have had the opportunity to have served in many roles within the department. I only hope that I was able to give a small portion back to this community as to what it has provided to me.

Thank you for all of your support throughout the years.





The diverse fleet of 23 vehicles currently used by the staff of the Marshfield Police Department consists of both very specialized fully marked police vehicles as well as a number of multi-purpose unmarked vehicles that are necessary to serve the community as efficiently and effectively as possible.

Our eight first-line fully marked vehicles are operated essentially 24 hours a day, and the annual mileage on each of these vehicles range from 31,000 to 43,000 miles. This places a great demand upon the vehicles, and maintenance on a single vehicle could easily exceed \$2,000 per year. Due to the type of driving required within a residential community, the majority of repairs to squad cars continue to involve the repair or replacement of brakes, tires, and batteries. Fortunately, many of our vehicles are covered by either a 36,000 mile bumper-to-bumper new car warranty or the factory 100,000 mile power train coverage which limits the potential liabilities of the extensive costs of major repairs. Maintenance of our vehicles is essential, and safety to our officers and others is of the highest concern. We take pride in our fleet of vehicles and attempt to keep them operating as efficiently and safely as possible within a fiscally responsible budget.

Each year we acquire quotes from local shops for our non-warranty repairs and general maintenance needs. This allows us to receive the best value available for the essential vehicle services that we need. The fleet maintenance contract for 2013 was awarded for the second consecutive year to Associated Sales and Leasing who offered the best overall cost savings of the 18 local service providers who were contacted and submitted quotes.

Vehicle Mileage Report 2013

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In a continued effort to minimize costs while ensuring the efficiency of our fleet, we opted to auction three additional used Chevrolet Impalas. For the third year, we utilized the services of Wisconsin Surplus Online Auctions in order to reach the broadest market possible. We have found great success with this approach as the auction service does essentially all of the administrative work including the listing, processing and collections involved in the process with no cost to the department. As a result of selling these vehicles, \$16,351 in revenue was generated to help offset some of the ever growing tax burdens of the citizens of our community.

Detained

During the year 2013, we had a total of 26 people detained within our jail facility. Normally, we detain a subject only until arrangements can be made for transportation to another facility or until the subject is released to a responsible party.

Booking Procedures

During 2013, we physically booked 603 people (447 males and 156 females). The booking process involves the taking of a set of fingerprints from an individual, as well as obtaining a photograph of the individual for our files. This total includes fingerprints taken for probation and parole registration. It should be noted that the number of people booked during the year does not include fingerprints taken for assisting citizens with employment, adoption, and taxicab applications.

2013**

The year 2013 was a busy year for the Marshfield Police Department Canine Unit. Both K9 Arco who is handled by Officer Schlei and K9 "H" who is handled by Officer Terry Endries, continue to be successful on the street. Some of the highlights of the year include K9 "H's" assistance in locating 11.5 pounds of marijuana in a vehicle coming from Colorado and K9 Arco's assistance in finding 24 grams of heroin which a subject had hidden in their body cavity.

Officer Schlei took K9 Arco to the University Of Wisconsin - Madison Veterinary School for a follow up on his heart condition. K9 Arco's medication was changed slightly but there were no changes to his health or condition; therefore, he will continue to work at his current level of service for the citizens of Marshfield.

During 2013 K9 Arco was deployed **121** times and K9 "H" was deployed **128** times for a total of **249** deployments. The majority of the deployments were vehicle sniffs. The other deployments consisted of building searches (for narcotics and persons), school searches for narcotics, area searches for persons, tracks for fleeing suspects, criminal apprehension, perimeter security, article searches for evidence, and public demonstrations.

Both handlers and their canines continue to train with Adams, Portage and Taylor County Sheriff Departments, and Loyal, Kronenwetter, Colby/Abbotsford, Everest Metro, and Wausau Police Departments. The training group will be adding new members with Marathon County recently adding three canine teams to their department.

Officer Endries and K9 "H" attended SKIDDS/CATS (SWAT and K9s Interacting During Deployment/CAnine Tactical Schools) training hosted by the Lafayette County Sheriff's Department. Officer Schlei and Officer Endries also attended the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Canine Handler Association conference hosted by the Wabeno Police Department. At the annual conference Officer Schlei and K9 Arco were nominated for Meritorious Article Find for K9 Arco locating a gun in Adams County. In 2013 Officer Schlei and Officer Endries successfully completed and recertified with their canine partners at canine recertification training at Vohne Liche Kennels in Denver, Indiana.

The Marshfield K9 teams of Officer Schlei/K9 Arco and Officer Endries/K9"H" look forward to continuing their high level of service to the City of Marshfield and the surrounding communities.

The City of Marshfield's police school liaison officer program has been in existence since 1986. Marshfield has two full-time police school liaison officers (PSLOs) to assist the young people of our community.

In September 2007, Officer Christine Giacomino was appointed to the PSLO position and assumed the duties at the Marshfield Middle School. She also responds to the needs of the Marshfield Elementary Schools as well as the private school sector.

In July 2012, Officer Rochley Gross was appointed to the PSLO position and assumed the duties at the Marshfield Senior High School. He also responds to the concerns of the private sector when requested.

The PSLOs have offices in their assigned public schools. During that time they are accessible to students, staff, and parents. They spend a considerable amount of time investigating youth crimes and youth victimization that occur within the City of Marshfield. These include truancy, thefts, assaults, drug and alcohol violations, weapons, contraband items, and other violations of state laws and local ordinances. Another function of these officers is to use proactive law enforcement efforts to ensure the students' safety and to prevent crimes committed by and against juveniles. By achieving these goals, law enforcement and young people form good working relationships, and our youth become productive members of the community.

Liaison officers also act as mentors by having open and scheduled office hours. They attend extracurricular activities and build relationships that are vital to the success of the school community. Mentoring affords the PSLO opportunities to connect with Marshfield's youth and help them succeed. They receive ongoing training in juvenile issues and other topics to assist them in their responsibilities.

TRAINING REPORT
2013**

We at the Marshfield Police Department strive to provide the highest quality of progressive and current training available while maintaining budgetary constraint. Many of the training courses attended by our staff members are offered by technical colleges and other institutions for little or no tuition fees. Over the last few years, the funds that were once available through Homeland Security have become far less available; however the Wisconsin Department of Justice has continued to provide funding assistance for a variety of specialized training. We continue to make every effort to take advantage of these excellent opportunities to train our personnel with minimal expense to the city. Without these considerations for police training, our training budget would be significantly higher. Almost all of the training that is attended by our officers is within the state of Wisconsin and, oftentimes within 50 miles of Marshfield which eliminates the need for lodging, and in turn the overall training costs. We have also been fortunate enough to have had quality training offered right here in Marshfield. Occasionally, advanced specialized training needs require that staff members travel outside the state of Wisconsin, but that is also limited to essential certifications that are only offered in very limited areas of the country.

To further reduce our training costs, we offer members of our department opportunities to become certified as a trainer in specialized fields of interest. Officers that have received specialized training become “in-house” trainers and consultants for other department personnel. Participative management of this nature allows the department to train more officers while remaining aware of prohibitive costs. It also provides our officers the opportunities to expand their knowledge base and enhance the potential for new career paths within the department.

- Personal and Professional Breakthroughs for Police Officers.

The State of Wisconsin requires that each officer must receive a minimum of 24 hours of training annually in order to maintain law enforcement certification. Each of our 39 sworn officers exceeded this standard by attending an average of 96 hours of training. This represents a total of approximately 3,700 hours of training for department personnel in 2013.

FIREARMS TRAINING
2013**

The firearms training program in 2013 continued to offer training on a monthly basis throughout the year to all officers of the department. Training consisted of several different courses utilizing the pistol, rifle, and shotgun. Emphasis was placed on movement, use of cover, and accuracy. With the hiring of Officer Jason Foemmel, additional training was conducted to ensure that the officer was proficient with the department's firearms.

The police department now has ten firearm instructors who are responsible for developing the monthly training plans as well as conducting the firearms training. These instructors are:

The maintenance of the range house, out buildings, and grounds at the range facility is the responsibility of Officer Landon Kramer. Officer Kramer accomplishes the maintenance with the assistance of the range instructors if needed.

In addition to training for the members of the police department, the range facility was open for hunters to sight in their rifles prior to deer hunting season in November, hunter safety courses, and DNR warden firearms training.

**MARSHFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT
TRANSPORT OFFICER PROGRAM
2013**

In 2011, the Marshfield Police Department implemented the transport officer program. This program was created in an effort to provide a cost savings to the citizens as well as to maintain a safer community by eliminating staffing shortages when a non-combative individual needed to be transported to a facility outside the city of Marshfield.

The civilians used as transport officers are scheduled through the use of the program's coordinator. This individual answers directly to the on-duty sergeant or administrative lieutenant. Transport officers are paid an hourly rate with a two hour minimum. This proves to be a cost savings over the three hour minimum previously paid to sworn officers at 1.5 times the officer's normal hourly rate.

In 2013, transport officers were used for 182 transports, totaling 417.25 hours paid. This equated to a cost of approximately \$5,187.50 to the city. Had sworn officers been used at their overtime rate of pay, the cost would have been \$30,523.25. This program shows a potential cost savings of approximately \$25,335.75 to the citizens of Marshfield in 2013.
