In 2017, there were many personnel changes to include the hiring of 2 officers as well as the resignation of 2 officers. The organization also experiences a structural change to include adding an Assistant Chief Position, changing our Sergeant Positions to Lieutenant Positions, and promoting our drug officers to drug detectives.





## Yearly Drug Arrests




## Drug Arrests Time of Day










## Traffic Crash Report



Reportable accident versus non-reportable accident: The difference between the two types of accidents is the estimated cost to repair damage sustained by a vehicle in the accident and whether a person is injured. An accident is considered reportable if the damage sustained by one vehicle is greater than \$1,000, a person is injured, or if damage to government property occurs with a value over \$200.

## Crash Report Time of Day




# Vehicle Mileage Report




## Gasoline Used





In a continued effort to minimize costs while ensuring the efficiency of our fleet, we auctioned the following vehicles through Wisconsin Surplus Online Auctions:


# TRANSPORT AND BOOKING STATISTICS





The Marshfield Police Department Canine Unit prides itself with the ability to provide a unique service that benefits our officers, department, and most importantly our citizens. The unit is comprised of two officers who train diligently with their canines to ensure the best possible outcome when they are deployed. The canines are trained to detect the odor of illegal drugs, track the scent of a person who may either be missing or hiding, and also to help officers locate evidence that a suspect may have discarded.





## Parking Citations Issued




Among all of the citations issued 1,494 were issued in 2017, 2,583 citations were issued in 2016, and 1,682 citations were issued in 2015.




Payment Funds Recovered by the City of Marshfield






## Total Animals at Large






