PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Mayor Meyer congratulated Alderperson Alanna Feddick and her husband on the birth of their son.

William Penker, 600 S. Sycamore Avenue. Prior to the public comment period on June 12th, the Council dealt with four actionable items. You have to consider the solemn message that was sent to the public that items are not worthy of their comments and that you do not want to hear from them until after the vote. At the last meeting, the Council dealt with the consideration of a successor to complete the unexpired term for the 4th District. This was held before the public comment period. This placement appears to be in conflict with the order of business as presented on the City website under Chapter 3, section 3-05. As a result of the placement of the item, 4th District residents were denied the opportunity to make on the record, public comments before the Council began their deliberations to fill the vacant seat. The Common Council by not asking the candidates any questions provided 4th District residents with no insight into what they were looking for in a successor alderman. The candidates were not made to defend positions and they were not able to publicly expand or expound on critical civic issues because none were presented to them by the Council. He asked the Common Council President and the Chairman of the Judiciary, License and Cemetery Committee to develop an ordinance to establish a more formal and defined process to be used to fill future vacancies in both emergency and nonemergency situations.

Human Resources Manager Baehr introduced Jason Angell who is the new Director of Planning and Economic Development.

Alderperson Wagner gave an update on the change on all Public Access channels. Channels 980-994 will now be the public access channels. This is scheduled to take place on August 12, 2008. Charter is maintaining that the public access channels will still be on the broadcast basic tier but you will need a digital converter box.

City Administrator Brehm presented a summary of the impact on service levels for all departments if a 5% reduction in service costs is implemented except for protective services. An estimated 5% service cost reduction equates to \$470,532 but when you take into account 2009 increases for salary/wage adjustments, insurance increases and related benefits the 2009 budget needs to be reduced by an estimated \$799,107 to achieve this goal. This represents an approximate range of 7% to 12% in reductions for individual budgets related to service cuts. If you use 10% as an average

reduction and the 186.75 FTE's currently on staff this equates to 38,844 hours annually, or 971 weeks, or 18.8 FTE positions cut. Not only will this reduction significantly impact services, it will also have a negative impact to the local economy and economic development efforts. Since 2000, the City has already cut 13.8 FTE's from its staff. Included in his report are the department/division head reports that provide a summary of the impact on service levels for their areas of responsibility based on a total reduction of \$799,107. From a broader perspective service cuts will be partially offset by unemployment compensation, estimated at \$172,379 for the 18.8 FTE positions, as well as significant revenue reductions in some areas. A reduction of \$799,107 in service cuts equates to a \$0.69 in the city's tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. On property valued at \$100,000 this would mean a reduction of \$69 in property taxes for city purposes. When you take into account the potential for unemployment compensation claims that is an increase in the tax rate by about \$0.15 or \$15,000 so the net impact is approximately \$54 on \$100,000 of valuation.

He suggested in his parameters that the 2009 budget parameters include a no tax rate increase. This would provide approximately \$250,000 more in taxes without changing the rate. There are some advantages to that; (1) building our rate for next year; (2) taking advantage of the State imposed levy limits; and (3) being able to meet expected service increases.

Aldersperson Wagner said that when they set out this parameter they wanted to see what could be cut and where the cuts could be made. The Common Council will look upon these as the things that they need to cut and the things that they need to keep. He doesn't suspect that this will be accepted on mass one way or the other. We have to try and we have to start somewhere. This is going to take some time to absorb.

Mayor Meyer commented that this has absorbed a majority of the staff time at City Hall over the last month. Compiling this data, looking at how these cuts would impact services and putting together memos. There is no recommended action tonight. His recommendation would be to delay any action until the next meeting so that the Council can research these cuts but they can get some feedback from the citizens in their district.

Aldersperson Hendler commended the Mayor, Administrator and staff for putting this list together. It was very courageous to come out with a realistic view of what could and can happen. We need to encourage the public to take notice because it has a tremendous impact on all of us. He would like the public to call and email them. Since the economy is going where it is going and there is an extreme amount of pain on part of the citizens out there we as a governmental service entity need to also re-examine ourselves. What we can do to help share that pain that exists throughout the community of the taxpayers.

Aldersperson Wagner stated that at first glance, he doesn't see anything creative in the report. Basically this is almost let's inflict as much pain as possible so that we don't have to deal with the parameters type of budget.

Mayor Meyer responded that's not the case. In fact, he specifically talked to some of the department heads and said that we need to be realistic. What is going to be cut? It's not scare tactics. These cuts are real. With the budget parameters the way they sit now, if they are not changed, those are the cuts that you will see and that will be the impact to services. Nothing is in stone, some things may change.

Administrator Brehm echoed Mayor Meyer's comments. These are realistic submissions by the departments with a lot of thought amongst themselves and their staff was involved with it too. This is the reality of it. There are a lot of administrative budgets and it is difficult because we don't keep track of the time involved in those administrative functions as to what can go and not go. Those services typically are ongoing. There are certain things as time goes along that are going to be passed by the way side because there is a lack of time to get them done.

Aldersperson Feirer said that this document does not surprise him. Everybody should go home and read this and let their constituents know that 5% is going to cost them a lot in their services.

Administrator Brehm highlighted some of the services that would be impacted as outlined in the reports that were presented by the City departments.
